Nominee: *Landowner's Options* (booklet & website by the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation)

Summary

In April 2007, the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation published the 6th edition of *Landowner's Options: Safeguarding Iowa's Natural Resources for the Future*. This 52-page booklet is targeted to Iowa's landowners, their families and their professional advisors. Its goal is to help landowners understand, and hopefully implement, permanent land protection options. Thus, the booklet describes 16 protection options—from bequests to bargain sales to conservation easements. Using everyday language, it explains how each option works, the legal and financial effects, potential partners and how to get started.

INHF published the first edition of *Landowner's Options* in 1982 (making this the booklet's 25th anniversary!). However, this new version is completely revised from all previous editions. Changes to the 6th edition include the addition of new topics (such as Land Protection Myths, Long-term Stewardship, Historical & Archeological Resources, and a Glossary), a four-color format with many full-color photos, several case studies, a less formal writing style, and a more user-friendly layout.

Copies of the 5th and 6th editions are included with this application. In early May 2007, we launched the booklet's online version, which you can view at www.inhf.org/landowner.

Promotion/distribution

INHF printed 15,000 copies of *Landowner's Options*, 6th edition, and intends to distribute them over the next 5-7 years. Since the booklet was published in April 2007, we have distributed more than 3,000 copies. Here are some of our target audiences and how we reach them:

- INHF distributes the booklet free of charge (including postage) to anyone on request. Most individual requests come from landowners or family members, but we also get requests from attorneys and financial planners.
- The complete booklet is also available online at www.inhf.org/landowner. This special section of INHF's website contains its own navigation bar, many cross-links, and other user aids. Since May 1, we have received more than 18,000 page-views to this section of our website.
- INHF provides up to 20 free copies of the booklet to conservation groups on request—and additional copies at a bargain price. We sent sample copies to each individual county conservation board, NRCS office, SWCD office, RC&D and similar organizations with information on ordering additional copies.
- INHF has presented information about the book and how to use it to groups of landowners, conservation professionals (such as several DNR departments and the annual IACCB convention), the IAN/ICEC Winter Solstice (pending in 2008), agricultural law students at Drake University and others.
- The booklet was promoted through the Iowa Bar Association's newsletter to its members, and they provided a table at their annual convention where we could promote and give it away to Iowa attorneys.
- The booklet and website have been promoted through media releases, newspaper public service ads, INHF e-mails and publications, and some farm/outdoor publications.

Promotion/distribution (cont.)

• INHF staff members provide free, confidential one-on-one education by phone or in person to landowners, their advisors and conservation professionals to help users apply the book's information to specific circumstances.

Partners

This project would not have been possible without many partners, who have provided funding, distribution assistance and/or peer review.

Technical assistance and peer review were provided by legal, financial and conservation professionals. A complete list is provided on page 2 of the booklet.

The project's financial supporters are listed on page 51 of the booklet. Major funders include INHF and the Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP) Conservation Education Program. Another 12 organizations provided up to \$1000 each. A small sample of these diverse partners includes the Iowa Conservation Education Council, the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, Pheasants Forever, the Office of the State Archeologist and two private law firms. Many of these organizations also helped distribute the booklets to their members, partners and peers.

These conservation-minded landowners are perhaps the "low-hanging fruit" for those willing to commit to long term protection of their land's natural resource features."

Next steps

• Though INHF conducted many promotions for this booklet/website in mid-2007, we plan to launch additional promotions effort in 2008 (and beyond). Landowners often don't "see" this information until they're ready to see it, so it's important to keep the story fresh. Winning this award would give us a trigger for additional promotions, helping us get this important information to more Iowa landowners.
